
SNOW, SNOW, AND MORE SNOW!!

For those of us in the Delaware Valley, this winter set a record for the number of days with subfreezing temperatures. On top of that we had the 2nd snowiest winter on record. Our December Celebrate Hope Concert at St. Mark's in Philadelphia had to be cancelled as several performers from the Rowan University Concert Choir found themselves and their cars in ditches along the highway and our players from Delaware were stuck in a traffic jam on Interstate 95.

We also had to cancel several rehearsals due to snow and ice and had to hold our breath on several other occasions to see if the snow would hold off until after rehearsal. Worst of all, we lost percussionist Matt Barone who slipped on the ice and tore his rotator cuff.

But Spring has arrived, knock wood! And the band has been very hard at work for performances at the Mid-Atlantic Brass Band Festival and the National Trumpet Competition, both of which are featured in this newsletter, as well as the upcoming NABBA Championship.

Although we weren't able to make up the missed rehearsals, we have rescheduled to Celebrate Hope Concert to May 18th, when we're pretty sure it won't snow. This looks to be an exciting concert where we will be joined by trumpeter Peter Bond of the Metropolitan Opera and the Atlantic Youth Brass Band. Furthermore the performance venue is the famous Temple Beth Shalom in Elkins Park, PA which was designed by Frank Lloyd Wright.



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3RD ANNUAL MID-ATLANTIC BRASS BAND FESTIVAL A HUGE SUCCESS!!



This year found the MABBF moved from University of Delaware to Rowan University, the home of the ABB. Saturday began with clinics by Brett Baker, Dean Witten, and Bryan

Appleby-Wineberg. Then after a break for lunch the Festival continued with a concert featuring 6 brass bands. Chesapeake Silver Cornet Brass Band, Penn View Brass Band, Brass of the Potomac, Rockville Brass Band, Atlantic Brass Band, and making their Festival debut, the Atlantic Youth Brass Band. The bands not only got to perform for an enthusiastic audience but were also critiqued by an excellent staff of adjudicators

that included, Brett Baker, Steve Bulla, & Nigel Horne as well as ABB's own Salvatore Scarpa and Bryan Appleby-Wineberg. Capping off the Saturday concert was a performance by Brett Baker accompanied by ABB. As well as the listed Ellerby Concerto for Trombone, Mr. Baker thrilled the crowd with two encores: Una Furtiva Lacrima by Donizetti and the classic Arthur Pryor work The Blue Bells of Scotland. The program

The festival continued early Sunday afternoon with the Young Artist Competition which was run by Amy Bliss. The prize winners were Catherine Simmons playing *Trumpet Etude* by Goedicke for the Middle School Division, Sriram Mohanakanthan playing *Andante and Rondo* by Capuzzi for the High School Division, Matt Hartmann playing the Neruda *Trumpet Concerto* (followed very closely by Kwanza Williams playing the Ketting *Intrada*) for College High Brass, and Joe Sino playing Philip Sparke's *Fantasy* for College Low Brass. Congratulations to all the winners!

The festival finished up with a concert of Chamber Enembles and Solo Artists which featured Sue Peo, principal cornet from Chesapeake playing "A Light in Heaven's Window", John Bland, Eb bass from Atlantic, playing Mvmt 2 of the Vaughan-Williams *Tuba Concerto*, the Rowan University Tuba Quartet playing Sousa's *Liberty Bell March*, the Rockville Ten playing an original arrangement of *Overture to the Gypsy Princess* by Kalman, and the Atlantic Brass Back Row playing *Within Sacred Walls* by Eric Morales.

THE NATIONAL TRUMPET COMPETITION



As if March wasn't exciting enough with the opportunity to play with Brett Baker the following week marked ABB's first appearance at the prestigious National Trumpet Competition which was held on March 22nd at Messiah College in Mechanicsburg, PA.

The band played a full concert starting with Richard Strauss' Festmusik der Stadt Wein, followed by The Earl of Oxford's March by William Byrd and Song & Dance by Philip Sparke featuring Dr. Bryan Appleby-Wineberg on cornet. Then came the heavy lifting as the band played Gregson's Symphony in Two Movements. The band next had the honor and pleasure of accompanying Ronald Romm (of Canadian Brass fame!) on the Del Staigers version of Carnival of Venice. On top of that we also got to accompany Robert Sullivan (of Northwestern U. formerly with NY Philharmonic, Cleveland Orchestra, & Cincinnati Symphony) on Escapade by Joseph Turrin followed by lovely traditional tune Danny Boy. After that he was joined by Ron Romm and Messiah Music Department Chair Dr. William Stowman in the trumpet trio, Roller Coaster by Johnny Cowell. Once the band was finally warmed up (right!) we finished the program with our NABBA choice piece, which we still can't tell you yet!



Fortunately, we didn't have to rehearse much beforehand as the 3 trumpet soloists joined us at Rowan University on the Thursday night before. Our chops were thankful for that!

Derek Danilson (Band Treasurer and former baritone player) and his wife Colleen are the proud parents of their first child, a boy.




Jacob Matthew Danilson was born January 1st and weighed in at 7 lb. 4 oz.
